1. Birds of a Feather

The Birds of a Feather class will empower PAL students to learn the art of bird watching and the science behind bird migrations. Staff and community volunteers will provide hands-on activities during several field trips to educate students on bird identification and characteristics, migration routes used and habitat needs.

- Students at Helena Middle School have been "getting caught" listening to audiobooks. This project is broadening reading interests, increasing reading comprehension and promoting academic excellence for even the most reluctant readers. Helena Middle School students also now have access to e-readers at their library through the "Nook for Reading" project.
- The snow is flying and students at Four Georgians Elementary are out exploring using their new snowshoes. Young adventurers will map their destinations and challenge their physical strength while enjoying winter in Montana.
- Helena High students are "On the Trail of Native American Art" in their Art History and Design Applications classes. They have been exploring the rich visual history left upon the land through Native American pictographs, petroglyphs, medicine wheels and archeological sites.
- Kessler Elementary students have constructed a bird watch feeder program in conjunction with the Nature Space at their school. They are learning to collect and analyze data using iPod Touches and are collaborating with Cornell University and community volunteers.
- High school students from Capital and Helena High spent a weekend at a German language immersion workshop. Students enrolled in German class came together to speak, play, cook and immerse themselves in the kind of all-German environment that cannot be created in the classroom.
- The "Prints & Scrolls" project brought local artist Phoebe Toland to every 4th grade classroom in the Helena School District to instruct students and teachers in the art of printmaking. Rossiter Elementary's beautiful display was featured at the Holter Museum of Art last spring.
