- the opportunity to learn the art of bird watching and the science behind bird migrations. Staff and community volunteers will provide hands-on activities during several field trips to educate students on bird identification and characteristics, migration routes used and habitat needs.
- Children with special needs require constant repetitive direct instruction to obtain the skills needed to become independent in limited areas of academics. Independence is Priceless is providing Hawthorne and Jim Darcy Elementary children with special needs enrichment through visual, tactile and auditory engagement with technology using the iPad2.
- The Birds of a Feather class will provide PAL students Machining students at Capital High are engineering and machining the components for building custom fishing rods. Students from the freshman English classes are building their own fishing rods as part of their "A River Runs through It" unit in collaboration with the machining students. What a great way to get young people hooked on fishing in Montana.
 - Sixth and seventh grade C.R. Anderson Middle School students have the opportunity to take the Robot Encounter class and build a variety of robots to compete in a series of design challenges that range from a jumping robot to a boxing robot. This weekly "Choice" class is bringing math and science to life in an innovative way.
- Helena High art students are creating an exhibition of self-portraits using the beautiful 170-year process of cyanotype printing. Students are exploring the art and science of photography, guided by two professional photographers and two photography teachers, using digital cameras, studio lights and the latest computer software to produce their negatives.
- Jim Darcy Elementary students are getting "knee deep" in learning as they use their critical thinking and observation skills in an outdoor setting. Using iPod Touches, students conduct their own field investigations in a wetland and riparian area. Combining nature with useful technology is creating an engaging experience that connects science and math.
