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1. Learning in Motion Teacher Recipient: Adrienne (Christy) Heun School: Rossiter Elementary Sponsor: Bill and Helen Ballinger

Creative movement will help more than 1000 4th and 5th graders learn about science when they participate in the University of Montana's CoMotion Dance Project's Interactive production called "Fire Speaks the Land." This 50 minute production uses dance and original music to teach science by actively engaging the students in learning.




2. Mixing Things Up! Teacher Recipient: Carrie McCue School: Smith Elementary Sponsor: Van's Thriftway

Mixing Things Up! offers students with special needs a chance to practice life skills through cooking exercises in the classroom, allowing hands-on learning and promoting independence for the children as they learn how to follow directions, budget with a shopping list, find items in a store, apply math concepts to recipes, handle food safely and prepare healthy snacks.



3. Prototype to Part *Teacher Recipient:* Jim Weber *School:* Capital High *Sponsor:* Dennis and Phyllis Washington Foundation

Students in the machining program at Capital High School will be able to go from idea to prototype in a matter of days, using their new 3D printer. Printing a 3D model of a part in order to check for functionality, design, and fit before beginning the machining process replicates the real world of modern manufacturing. CHS language arts students reading *A River Runs through It* will also use the printer to build fishing reels as a continuation of a previous HEF grant "Montana Fishin' and Chips."



4. An Alternative Titration Teacher Recipient: Denise Thomas School: Helena High Sponsor: Helena High School Class '62

An analytical balance and reusable polyethylene wash bottles for second year chemistry students will allow them to conduct college level gravimetric titration and compare the results to a traditional volumetric titration. Students will have the opportunity to employ the method during labs throughout the year, share findings on the accuracy of each method and explore advantages and disadvantages of both techniques.

5. Kids are Geniuses Teacher Recipient: Marla Unruh Schools: Broadwater Elementary Sponsor: Dowl

Students in "The Genius Club" will gain access to digital learning in science through a collection of e-books and maker kits. Not only will these digital and hands-on tools expose students to science in new ways, but also to concepts in technology, engineering, art, and math. Carefully selected digital and handson tools add creative elements of discovery learning to the usual classroom approach of direct instruction, modeling, and practice. Students in the club will meet during lunch-time sessions to pursue their questions and try out their results.



 Geysers and Bison and Wolves, Oh My!

Fourth grade students at Bryant School will spend 2 days in Yellowstone National Park exploring the Geyser Basin and Lamar Valley with a professional guide. Classroom lessons related to Yellowstone National Park will prepare students to engage with scientists, rangers and educators in a variety of settings. Thanks to the new White House youth initiative "Every Kid in a Park," all fourth grade students can receive free passes into all national parks for the 2015-2016 school year.



Listening, Learning: A Leg Up for Young Musicians

Listening, Learning: A Leg Up for Young Musicians will help every student become "tuneful, beatful, and artful" musicians through the use of a Lightspeed Topcat classroom amplification system. Students learn best when they have the opportunity to clearly hear their teacher's singing voice as well as the solo voices of their classmates. This music classroom will use a Lightspeed Topcat system to amplify both teacher and student voices along with musical excerpts and other examples.



8. Connecting the World with Flags Teacher Recipient: Patrick Rieley School: Rossiter Elementary Sponsor: Tim and Piper Lynch

Connecting the World with Flags brings a display of flags from every country around the world into the classroom, providing a visual and physical manipulative that students will be able to access when studying different countries. Students will grow up in a global culture and these 4th graders will study that international community by making flags of other nations part of their daily experience in the classroom. Students will share what they learn at a school-wide International Day in May.



 9. What are HeLa Cells and Why Should I Care?
Teacher Recipient: Sarah Urban School: Capital High
Sponsor: St. Peter's Hospital

Capital High School students will use the *New York Times* bestseller, *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks* as a framework to learn about cells, cell division, scientific research, and scientific ethics. The class will study the same cell line from Henrietta Lacks (He La cells) that is used in worldwide research laboratories. This project incorporates reading a nonfiction scientific best-selling book that is written, not only to explain science, but also to explore ethical issues often overlooked in high school science courses.



10. Clean Air and Healthy Homes *Teacher Recipient:* Logan Mannix *School:* Capital High

Sponsor: Blue Cross Blue Shield of Montana

Using Dylos Air Quality Monitors, Capital High School students will learn about air pollution in their homes and various locations in our community and will work with scientists to design, conduct, and present the results of individual or small group research projects at a symposium at the University of Montana.



11. A Book to Bring a Community Together

The "One School, One Book" program creates a shared reading experience throughout an entire school community and highlights the importance of family literacy. With help from HEF, Rossiter will purchase one chapter book for each student. Students, staff, and families will enjoy a month long reading extravaganza with enriching activities to promote the excitement of reading.

To date, HEF has awarded 274 grants, totalling more than \$542,926 and involving more than 85% of Helena's teachers:
