6. Budding Birders

Teacher: Jane Shawn, Four Georgians Elementary

Budding Birders will provide young students the opportunity to participate in citizen science. Using binoculars especially designed for kids, students will observe and identify birds in a natural habitat and report their findings to Cornell Lab Project FeederWatch. Students will also photograph birds and work with a local artist to paint birds on actual canvas—this transforms a STEM project into a STEAM project!

7. Coding Without Tears

Lower elementary and library teachers will use the toy robot *Cubetto* to teach computational thinking with positive impact on learning across content areas. *Cubetto* is a manipulative that requires no computer application or connection and introduces kindergarteners, 1st and 2nd graders to the algorithms that make coding work.

What is the Great Ideas Grant Program?

Great Ideas Grants put money directly into the hands of classroom teachers, empowering educators to turn their ideas for innovative teaching strategies into action.

Grants are named after major donors to the Helena Education Foundation.

Highlights from past grant awards:

- ▶ Twisting and Turning Means More Learning: Through flexible seating designed to serve various learning styles, students are encouraged to harness energy and movement in a positive way. With wobble stools, stationary bike desks, rolling ball chairs, and both lap and standing desks, students practice making choices in their learning environment that foster collaboration, creativity and problem solving.
- ▶ You Really Can Do That in a High School Classroom? From CRISPR to Algal Beads: Students edit bacterial DNA using CRISPR, analyze their mitochondrial DNA using PCR and electrophoresis, model the impacts of nicotine and cocaine on neurotransmission, search for antibiotic substances in their environment and investigate photosynthesis and respiration using algal beads. They really can do this in the high school biology classroom!
