1. Sleeping Giant Soundscape

Teacher: Jennifer Skogley, Broadwater Elementary

(Soundscape (n): a piece of music considered in terms of its component sounds.) In *Sleeping Giant Soundscape*, 4th grade students will connect literature, music and science to create a musical illustration to the story about the people of Pupickton, who live in fear of their mountain, the Sleeping Giant! This project will include study of Helena's Sleeping Giant as well.

2. Printing Pride

Printing Pride will enable high school students to combine creativity and school pride, forging an overall connection to community. The funds will purchase printmaking equipment, providing students the opportunity to design and produce merchandise promoting school spirit while exploring a possible career path and acquiring new skills—screen printing, as well as other production and printing techniques.

3. Healing Comes Home

The Healing Library provides an innovative resource to address the consequences of trauma that can negatively impact student performance at school. Through this project, students and families will benefit from take-home kits that address a variety of sources of trauma, like divorce or death of a loved one. The kits will build students' skills in self-management and awareness, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making, which will in turn have a positive impact on learning.

4. Cyber Cycling

Studies show that providing short periods of exercise throughout the week benefits students with improved focus and an increase in positive behaviors. Combining the world of virtual reality with access to exercise equipment in the library, funds from HEF will purchase an exercise bike, VR headsets and more for the school library to encourage exercise while reading. **Sponsor: Blue Cross Blue Shield of Montana**

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5. Creative Human Flow Teacher: Katie Knight, PEAK Programs at Helena Middle School and CRA

Two forms of flow intersect in this dynamic project: movement of human populations and psychological immersion in creative process. Humans experience a state of flow when totally engaged and enthused. Students will research human population flow, then engage in creative flow working with guest artists. Let's Get Vocational will allow students who receive special education services to build upon the traditional classroom-based vocational education and actually put their skills to use in a student run, multi-academic job skills venture where they will gain numerous and invaluable vocational skills to last throughout high school and beyond! **Sponsor: Ed and Mary Barrett**

7. Save Our Trails

Teacher: Jerri Rittel, Project for Alternative Learning

Students will participate in an outdoor classroom, working with Prickly Pear Land Trust, Montana Conservation Corps and Lewis and Clark County Extension Office to discover and learn about our delicate ecosystem and ways to preserve and protect our wet and wild lands for years to come. HEF funds will purchase GPS units, compasses and other equipment to enhance the outdoor experience.

No Fear Shakespeare editions pair traditional text sideby-side with contemporary language, easing students into the world of Shakespeare's while maintaining interest and creating a deeper understanding of the work. HEF funds will purchase classroom sets of *The Tempest* and *Twelfth Night* for four HHS teachers to share with their classes.
