This grant will increase teacher collaboration while helping teachers to film and share their best strategies, record lessons for students who are absent or work towards National Board Certification or higher degrees. *The Swivl* is a robotic base mounted to an iPad for video recording. The device automatically follows the teacher and includes a remote microphone that captures both the teacher's voice and student discourse.
