Creative Movement for Focused Learning

Grant recipient: Janna McBride Four Georgians Elementary School

Creative Movement encourages motor skills development, social connection, emotional and physical confidence, joy, focus, and cognitive engagement. This grant brought instructors from the Cohesion Dance Project into Four Georgians Elementary where they used movement patterns to improve readiness to learn and taught tools for managing stress, anxiety, and strong emotions. These outreach classes incorporated dance activities and movement exploration for students of all ability levels. Students took on several collaborative challenges requiring them to move outside of their comfort zones, to cooperate and build relationships, and to connect with their bodies.

Four Georgians Elementary School

Group drumming is a cool avenue for building teamwork and respect. It generates incredible participation, even from students who normally self-select out of music activities. But when it comes to drums, size matters. At least, it should. This fall, 4Gs students discovered that their smallest drums, which should be the highest in pitch, produced a dull, thud-y, low pitch. Teamwork with a Drum on Top brought a high-quality, high-toned drum to their classroom, as well as two modern, durable West African rattles called shekere. *Grant sponsor:* Quinn Erwin Dental

Bird Buddies

Grant recipient: Kellen Alger Jefferson Elementary School

Funds from this grant purchased an interactive bird feeder and field guides of Montana birds. Students now use these materials as part of a science and social studies unit focusing on Montana wildlife. The bird feeder allows students to collect data on the types of birds found here in Helena and to learn to use the field guides to identify birds. This particular bird feeder has a built-in camera that can record video/photos of the birds that visit it, and it allows AI to help identify the specific species observed.

A Day at the Bray Grant recipient: Shana Berry Rossiter Elementary School

This grant will help fund a field trip for first graders from Rossiter to have a 'Day at the Bray' including a 50 minute tour to learn about brick making, the various artists, and pottery; a sack lunch outside on the historic art grounds surrounded by hundreds of ceramic artifacts and site-specific sculptures created by former resident artists; and a two-hour art lesson resulting in a piece of art that students can take home. The trip will open students' eyes to part of Helena's history and expand their knowledge of art and culture.

The Lunch & Literature program aims to create an inclusive, student-led book club at Helena High School for high school students to meet during lunch. This club offers students a chance to read, discuss, and explore literature in a relaxed and social setting. The hope is to foster a love of reading, critical thinking, and community among students while providing an enriching, low-pressure alternative to the traditional lunch period. By empowering students to lead the book selection and discussion process, this initiative also encourages the development of essential social, communication, and leadership skills.
